2022—2027 Strategic Plan Update

The Vestry members continue to work with members of the congregation and staff to achieve the goals set in our 5 year strategic plan. Here is a brief reminder of the 5 goals the parish set in 2022 and a bit about how each is proceeding. In 2023, the Vestry created a separate task force to assist in developing a format for assessing the needs for each goal, determining any obstacles to meeting it, developing a set of achievable milestones, and producing a timeline for each milestone. While the players assigned to each goal have rotated some as the Vestry members have changed over, the goals have remined constant and progress continues on each goal. The subcommittees would love to have additional members so if one of these goals is of interest to you, please contact any Vestry member or the office to let hem know you would like to be involved.

- Growth of the Parish: This group is concerned with how our parish shrinks and grows, how the dynamics of our congregation have changed and will change, and what is the optimal sustainable goal for our parish community. Some new ideas are being considered for how we get the word to others about the wonderful community we enjoy.
- ♦ **Growth in Volunteerism:** This group ultimately wants to find a place for everyone to share his/her talents to help Emmanual do what we do and perhaps do more. Questions like how we find volunteers and how volunteers know what opportunities are available concern this subcommittee.
- Stewardship: Our level of stewardship in terms of time, talent, and treasure is essential to the success of the other 4 goals. The task force worked all last summer on what was ultimately a very successful annual giving campaign. How do we keep that going? What are our needs for 2025 and beyond? How do leverage our volunteers, and in-house talent? These are the issues the stewardship committee is exploring.
- Children and Youth Ministry: Finding Rev. Jen Leahey was a HUGE step forward in rejuvenating and redesigning our children and youth ministries. They could not be more vibrant! Thanks to Jen! How do we sustain this and continue to be creative? How do we best support Jen in her efforts? These questions occupy the thinking of this subcommittee.
- Operational Systems: As times change, processes change, technology changes, and personnel changes, we need to sustain our parish activities and information needs while also providing for continuity, sharing of knowledge, and caring for our clergy and staff. All of these are the purview of the subcommittee working with this goal.

Mental Health First Aid

Mental health challenges are not new to any of us as our live engage with a variety of people each day, some of whom may face mental health challenges.

MHFA training teaches the initial help given to a person showing signs of a mental health crisis. City of Alexandria residents can complete the eight-hour course virtually to earn a MHFA certification. The course teaches risk factors, warning signs and symptoms of mental health and substance use disorders; the effects of the conditions and an overview of treatments; and a five-step action plan for helping someone with symptoms. This training does not prepare someone to diagnose or provide treatment. It is designed to help paraprofessionals and laypersons provide support until an individual is linked to professional resources.

You must attend either an all-day 8 hour session or both 4 hour sessions to complete the course. May 20 (all day), June 19 and June 20 (must attend both days), July 29 (all day), August 21 and August 22 (must attend both days). Registration is open until filled. 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In lieu of a preschool page this month, a message from Jen about her involvement with EPS:

One of the many excitements of joining the Emmanuel team last spring was the opportunity to reimagine the EEC clergy's relationship with the students, faculty, and parents of Emmanuel Preschool. After brainstorming and discerning throughout the summer with EPS director Nicole Crochet, it has been my privilege this academic year to engage the EPS fold as their chaplain! This newly imagined role includes multiple different responsibilities, including leading monthly chapel, going into the preschool classrooms to lead special programming on a class-by-class basis, and being present every morning to interact with the students and assist the teachers and administration as needed.

Chapel this year has been a joy, as together we have sung songs, participated in hands-on activities, heard stories, and learned how God is present in our lives through many different themes. Monthly themes can relate to the liturgical calendar, the school calendar, or if the stars align, an intersection of the two! An example of this intersection was a creation-based chapel during EPS Earth Week. Additional chapel themes have included The Fruits of the Spirit, Growing, Loving, and The Lost Sheep.

Being back in the classroom has been such a unique joy for me. At the request of the teachers, I visit each classroom to lead special programming. For example, in early 2024 I focused a lesson on one of our Fruits of the Spirit – kindness – which, as you can imagine, is a vital lesson to be learned in a preschool setting. Together, we read a book on kindness, then created our own "Kindness Quilt," just like the characters in the book. This quilt can still be seen downstairs, on the wall adjacent to the fish tanks; feel free to check it out and read about all the ways we can show kindness to those around us!

The ministry of presence has been, and will always be, a critical part of my ministry. Being at church every morning and visible to students, parents, and teachers, has helped to solidify such a beautiful bridge between the church and the preschool. My door is always open during preschool hours, and random visits from teachers and students are very often the highlight of my work day. There's nothing like taking a break from sermon writing to play with my "Fishers of Men" fish and nets with a four-year-old!

This strong relationship between EPS and EEC was palpable during "Preschool Sunday," in which the EEC fold welcomed EPS families into our 10am worship service. The preschool students and EEC children joined their voices together in singing "The Butterfly Song" – one of our monthly EPS chapel songs – and feedback from EPS parents included the warm welcome they received from the EEC congregation, and the joy they felt during the service. It was a Spirit-filled (Holy Spirit, that is!) morning, for certain.

As this academic year rapidly draws to a close, it is heartwarming to reflect on the relationships that have been formed and nurtured within EPS this year. I am humbled and privileged to play a small part in God's work in and among these fabulous classrooms and families, and can't wait for the adventures next year will bring!
